ABOUT NEWCASTLE

As the economic hub of the Hunter region, Newcastle is a centre for health, tourism, education, environmental services, manufacturing, retail, mining, information technology, export and finance. Newcastle boasts a robust economy and offers real employment choice.

The region is well serviced by Newcastle Airport, and easily accessible by road and rail. Newcastle has a regional population of about 500,000 people, a thriving commercial sector, and an excellent network of health care and education facilities.

Combined with a comparatively low cost of living and a favourable climate, Newcastle offers a relaxed and welcoming lifestyle that has all the city comforts – restaurants, cafes, art galleries, sporting facilities and shopping centres.

Home to both creative and sporting festivals, Newcastle has a vibrant artistic scene and offers many recreation opportunities. Newcastle's harbour waterfront is a popular leisure area for locals and visitors.

Newcastle was selected as one of the top 10 cities in the world in 2011 by <u>Lonely</u> Planet.

The nearby Hunter Valley vineyards are a short drive away and have been named in

the top five wine destinations in the world and as the number one wine destination in the South Pacific by <u>TripAdvisor</u>.

Port Stephens, Barrington Tops National Park and Lake Macquarie, the largest coastal saltwater lake in Australia, are an easy day trip from the city.

Compared to Sydney, property in the Newcastle region offers excellent value. Housing options are diverse, and include water frontages, rural acreages, suburban living, period homes and contemporary apartments. Harbourside development has revitalised much of the city, resulting in residential developments, alfresco dining and boutique shopping.

WHERE TO LIVE

BEACH AND CITY LIVING

If you want to live near the beach and the city the suburbs to look at are:

- Newcastle
- Newcastle East
- The Hill
- Bar Beach
- Cooks Hill
- The Junction
- Merewether

These suburbs are near the beaches, are close to or in the city of Newcastle and are within walking distance of Darby Street, known for its many cafes and restaurants.

Most of these suburbs are within cycling or walking distance of the University's City Precinct (Graduate School of Business, University of Newcastle Legal Centre and the Conservatorium of Music).

Maryville, Wickham and Carrington are within the new Honeysuckle Development area, which is within cycling or walking distance of the city (approximately 20 to 25 minute walk to centre of the city).

Hamilton is another popular suburb and is halfway between the beaches and the University. Beaumont Street in Hamilton is popular because it is very cosmopolitan and has many restaurants.

Newcastle's beaches and city centre are a 30 minute bus journey from the University and there are train stations with connections to the University close to most of the above suburbs.

CLOSE TO THE UNIVERSITY

Adamstown, Mayfield, Kotara, Georgetown and Broadmeadow are also suburbs which have good public transport and are not far from either the City or Callaghan campuses.

LIVING ON THE LAKE

Another option to consider is living in the suburbs around Lake Macquarie. This area provides a good bus service from such areas as Charlestown (11 km from Callaghan) and Warners Bay (13 km from Callaghan), and if you have a car it is only ten minutes to the beaches and the lake. These areas are quieter than those closer to Newcastle.

LOCAL FACILITIES

EDUCATION AND CHILD CARE

Newcastle offers excellent schools at secondary, primary and pre-school level as well as a good number of quality child care options in most suburbs. Please see our separate brochure on Schools and Child Care for further information.

Higher Education is delivered through both the University of Newcastle and Hunter TAFE who provide vocational education and training in campuses throughout the Hunter region. Visit www.hunter.tafensw.edu.au for further information.

LIBRARIES

There are nine library branches in Newcastle, and ten in the Lake Macquarie area. All libraries in Australia are free to join and you may borrow a range of items including books, magazines, CDs and DVDs. There are also computers with internet access available at all libraries as well as printing, fax and photocopying facilities.

PLACES OF WORSHIP

Australia does not have an official or state religion and there people practicing many different faiths in Newcastle. There are places of worship for many religions including for those who are Anglican, Assemblies of God, Baptist, Buddhist, Catholic, Church of Christ, Greek Orthodox, Islamic, Jewish, Jehovah's Witnesses, Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian, Quakers, Russian Orthodox, Salvation Army, Seventh Day Adventist and the Uniting Church.

HEALTH SERVICES

There are a number of private and public health facilities in Newcastle, including hospitals, medical centres, and mental health, rehabilitation and palliative care services. The John Hunter Hospital is the major public hospital in the Hunter region and includes the John Hunter Children's Hospital. There are GP practices or medical centres in most suburbs in and around Newcastle. You are free to choose where you register for GP services, however you will need a Medicare number to do so.





LOCAL FACILITIES

RECREATION FACILITIES

There are 345 parks in the Newcastle region including 146 which are playing fields for sporting activities. The council also provides 60 tennis courts, 87 netball courts, 103 children's playgrounds, 5 public swimming pools and a wide range of other facilities.

The many beaches in Newcastle offer patrolled swimming between the red and yellow flags and most beaches have changing facilities, showers and toilets, shade shelters, parking, disabled access and picnic and BBQ areas. The Ocean Baths at Newcastle and Merewether offer ocean swimming in a safe, pool environment.

Blackbutt Reserve is an area of bushland with wildlife exhibits, walking trails, picnic areas and children's playgrounds located 15 minutes drive away from the centre of Newcastle.

Newcastle also has facilities for the cinema, bowling, ice-skating and rock-climbing.

ARTS AND CULTURE

There is a strong and growing arts scene in Newcastle and many small and independent galleries are opening up in the city centre. Newcastle is also home to the Newcastle Art Gallery, housing one of Australia's most substantial public art collections outside of a major capital city.

The Civic Theatre, a heritage-listed theatre in the heart of the city, shows a wide range of performances from musicals and plays to comedy and music concerts and there are cinemas located both in the city centre and in the suburbs.

SHOPPING

Most of Newcastle's suburbs have a local shopping area, usually including a supermarket and other useful shops. There are two main large shopping centres, Westfield Kotara and Charlestown Square, situated in Newcastle which provide a wide variety of individual and chain stores.

For more individual and boutique shopping Hunter Street, Darby Street and The Junction are home to a mix of local, national and international designers and other giftware shops. Newcastle is also well known for its thriving antique shops located in the city centre, Islington and Mayfield

Newcastle and its surrounding areas have a diverse range of markets including arts and crafts markets, vintage markets, bric-a-brac and a weekly farmer's market selling local produce at the Newcastle Showground.

EATING OUT AND ENTERTAINMENT

Newcastle has a thriving restaurant and nightlife scene with many excellent places to eat and drink. Newcastle East, Darby Street, Beaumont Street, The Junction and the harbour-side Honeysuckle Wharf area all feature top-class venues including restaurants and cafes of different cuisines as well as a variety of bars and nightclubs.

The Hunter Stadium is host to Newcastle's major sporting events and home ground to the Newcastle Knights (NRL) and the Newcastle Jets (A-League Football).

Newcastle also has its own racecourse at Broadmeadow Racecourse, home to the Newcastle Jockey Club, where races are held throughout the year.





TRANSPORT

GETTING TO NEWCASTLE

By road

If you are coming from Sydney, or south of Newcastle, take the F3 and follow the signs for Newcastle. Alternatively, if you are entering the city from the north, follow the Pacific Highway.

The Golden and New England Highways are also routes into Newcastle from the west and north-west.

By air

Newcastle Airport (Williamtown) is the major regional airport and is located 30 minutes from Newcastle's city centre. Many direct flights are available on a daily basis from Sydney, Melbourne, Canberra, Brisbane, the Gold Coast and Ballina.


The Stockton Ferry connects Queens Wharf, Newcastle with Stockton Wharf. Visit www.newcastlebuses.info for more details.

ABOUT AUSTRALIA

THE COUNTRY

Australia is a country of natural beauty, bound by more than 7,000 gorgeous beaches that boast crystal clear blue waters. It is also home to some of the world's most amazing ancient rock formations and unspoiled rainforests. It really is unparalleled. Australia is the sixth largest country in the world but in contrast has one of the lowest population densities, with an average of just three people per square kilometre.

CULTURE AND CUSTOMS

Australian culture and customs have evolved as a result of a rich combination of Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander peoples and many nationalities who have brought with them their traditions, legends, myths and folklore. Since 1945, more than six million people have migrated to Australia from across the globe. Today, more than 20 per cent of Australians are foreign-born, and more than 40 per cent are of mixed cultural origin. The rich cultural diversity is also reflected in Australian food, where a great deal of the world's cuisines have been happily embraced and in some places, skillfully fused.

CLIMATE

Australian climate for the most part is considered temperate in that it is generally quite mild and free from extreme weather conditions and temperatures. Parts of New South Wales, Victoria and Tasmania receive snow falls across some of their mountain ranges, making skiing a popular recreational activity in these regions throughout winter.

LIVING IN AUSTRALIA

Australian residents enjoy a high quality of life. Low cost of living, room to move, active lifestyle, picturesque landscapes and a rich culture make Australia one of the most desirable countries to live in. Australian people are famous for their friendly and easygoing outlook on life. It's all about a 'fair go', the great outdoors, innovative ideas, active living and a thriving arts scene. Australians are moving towards greener sustainable living, reducing their impact on the environment and providing for their future generations.

VISA REQUIREMENTS

People who are not Australian citizens or permanent residents must obtain the legal entitlement to work in Australia as granted by the Department of Immigration and Citizenship prior to commencing employment.

APPLY FOR A TAX FILE NUMBER (TFN)

To receive an income in Australia, you need a Tax File Number (TFN). Income includes wages or salary from a job, payments from the government, and money earned from investments including interest on savings accounts.

Once in Australia, you can telephone the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) and have a TFN application form sent to you. Alternatively, you can apply for a TFN through the ATO website.

REGISTER WITH MEDICARE

The Australian Government provides help with basic medical expenses through Medicare.

You may be eligible to join Medicare and gain immediate access to health care services including free public hospital care, help with the cost of out-of-hospital care, and subsidised medicines.

To enrol in Medicare, you should go into a Medicare office 7 to 10 days after your arrival in Australia and bring your passport or travel documents. You should also consider private health insurance as Medicare does not cover all services, for example Medicare does not cover dental care, most optical care or ambulance services.

OPEN A BANK ACCOUNT

In Australia, most income including salary or wages and government benefits are paid directly into a bank account. You should open a bank account within six weeks of your arrival, as you usually need only your passport as identification. After six weeks you will need extra identification to open an account. Alternatively, most major banks in Australia allow you to open an account from overseas up to 12 months prior to arrival in Australia

ENROL YOUR CHILDREN IN SCHOOL

Under Australian law, all children under 17 must be in approved education or training, undertaking a traineeship or apprenticeship, in full-time employment, or in a combination of training and employment until they turn 17.

APPLY FOR A DRIVER'S LICENCE

If you want to drive in Australia, you will need to have the appropriate driver's licence. In Australia, drivers' licences are issued by state and territory governments. You may be required to pass a knowledge test, a practical driving test, and an eyesight test.
