

Mary loved her five nephews, coming to all the major events in their lives including graduations and weddings. The whole family were devastated when Gerard, an alumnus of the University, passed away. Gerard grew up in a single parent low-income family in Newcastle. Gerard was forced to work and study part time to achieve his dream of becoming a mechanical engineer. It was, at times, a rough right of passage. To honour Gerard and to help other struggling aspiring engineers, the family set up the Gerard Beiboer Shaping Futures Scholarship in Mechanical Engineering, assisting students facing educational disadvantage to pursue higher education.

Mary was very passionate about the scholarship and donated throughout her life. She enjoyed reading the stories of the recipients.

## **PROFESSOR DAPHNE KEATS**



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#### The late Professor Daphne Keats was a distinguished staff member of the University and a psychology trailblazer. Her passion for cross-cultural psychology will live on through her generous bequest.

Born in Sydney in 1925, Daphne's fierce determination and intellect was evident from a young age. She earned herself a place at the selective North Sydney Girls High School, and graduated from the University of Sydney in 1946.

Daphne joined the University of Newcastle as a lecturer in Psychology in 1970. Alongside her husband, the late Professor John Keats, she led the field in developing programs of crosscultural psychology studies.

Daphne's strong relationships led to important collaboration across university teaching and course planning, professional development and research supervision in both Australia and Asia. Her legacy includes the interweaving of research and teaching in the cross-cultural psychology field.

Daphne's prolific output of published books, research publications and related work is another testament to her enduring intellect, curiosity and generosity towards her field. In their lifetime, the Keats established the John and Daphne Keats Endowment Research Fund to philanthropically support research in the School of Psychology. This fund provides an invaluable resource to PhD students and staff to support pilot and small projects that enable subsequent large collaborative cross-cultural grants and initiatives.

Daphne's generous bequest to the Endowment Fund and the Daphne Keats Chair in Cross-Cultural Psychology will ensure that her passion and legacy will continue to positively impact researchers and research output for generations to come.

#### The late Rita Leech knew the importance of education and hated discrimination, oppression and injustice. Her passion for equity will live on through the Rita Leech Indigenous Scholarship.

Maria Theresia van Zon, Rita Leech, was born in the Netherlands. As a teenager she knew war and occupation, cold, fear and near starvation. As one of many siblings and partly owing to the depredations of war, Rita had no opportunity for the tertiary education for which she was so eminently suited.

As a young woman Rita came to Australia. She was intelligent, feisty and determined, quickly learning the modes and mores of a new country. Throughout her life she was a vocal opponent of all forms of injustice. After her husband died, she moved to the Central Coast. On learning of the dreadful colonial legacy with regard to Indigenous people, she volunteered for many years with the local Aboriginal Reconciliation Group.

In her seventies, she decided to go to university, majoring in French and German and gaining high distinctions. At that point fate led to Bernard, the love of her later life. With typical courage, she chose their life together above completing her studies, having proved to herself that she could succeed academically.

This scholarship is the fruit of Rita's life experience and love of justice.
