The University of Newcastle opens its doors, with the first 138 students graduating in 1966.



The Great Hall opens following a community "buy-a-brick" campaign started by alumni and former Lord Mayor. Dr Frank Purdue CBE.



Open Foundation is established to provide a free pathway program to gain entry to the University. Today, it's the oldest and largest program of its kind in Australia.



2NURFM begins broadcasting and is keeping our community connected decades later with the support of donors.



Friends of the University forms and goes on to raise over \$1 million for scholarships and university projects to date.



From its beginnings in the 1980's, the Wollotuka Institute formed to support the academic, health, practical and employment needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students.



The First Shaping Futures Scholarship is awarded and has since helped more than 670 students in need of financial support to achieve their dreams through education.



The University launches its first workplace donation program. Now known as the Staff Donor Collective, members have donated close to \$500,000 to support causes through the University.



The Newcastle Australia Institute of Higher Education in Singapore is opened.



The Development Office is established to fundraise across the University and is now known as the Office of Alumni and Philanthropy.



Harold Brawn leaves a \$5 million beguest to honour his wife, Gladys Brawn, in support of medical research.



The first students graduate from the Indigenous Australian Medical Students Program.



The Ma & Morley Scholarship Program is launched with a US\$20 million gift from the Jack Ma Foundation – the largest individual donation in the University's history. Formed through friendship, the Program aims to empower the next generation of globally aware and socially conscious leaders.



The Paul Ramsay Foundation's \$17.4 million grant for quality teaching rounds is announced, with a further \$4.28 million pledged in 2024 – the largest philanthropic partnership supporting research in the University's history.



The Mark Hughes Foundation establishes a dedicated research team led by the inaugural MHF Chair in Brain Cancer. A further generous donation in 2022 establishes the Mark Hughes Foundation Centre for Brain Cancer Research at the University, with over \$17.8 million pledged to date.



Gifting Day launches bringing together staff, students, alumni and friends, and has since raised more than \$785,000 for programs to benefit our communities.
