OVERVIEW

Course Description	In this course students will explore the theory and practice of features journalism in print and digital formats. Students will develop their research, interviewing, and writing skills by producing a variety of feature articles for publication in text and digital forms.

SYLLABUS

Course Content Students will read and analyse published works of long-form and opinion-based journalism and produce their own articles in a virtual newsroom. Topics will include opinion writing, reviewing, interviewing techniques, news writing, storytelling, using images, online layout, using language, narrative techniques, pitching and freelance journalism.

1. Identify the role of journalism in society.
2. Apply professional writing and research skills to produce features journalism appropriate to print and digital forms.
3. Critically reflect on their professional practice.

Assessment 1 – Film Review – 25%

Assessment Type	Professional Task
Description	You will write a 600-word review of a new release film chosen by the course coordinator; you will have a choice of films, announced in Week 3. The film review will follow the conventions of film reviewing (discussed in class in week 3). The task is divided into two parts: your film review (25%) and your rewritten film review following marking and feedback (5%).

Assessment 2 – Personal Profile – 25%

Assessment Type	Professional Task
Description	You will write an 800-word personal profile of an individual who is newsworthy. You will choose the subject of your profile in consultation with your tutor. The profile will be written according to the conventions of profile writing (discussed in class in Week 5). You will include a photograph you have taken of your subject, appropriate to the theme of the article. The task is divided into two parts: a profile pitch (5%) and a completed profile (20%).

Assessment 3 – Long-form Feature – 50%

Assessment Type	Professional Task
Description	You will produce a 1500-word digital feature story comprising text, audio/video components and images on a subject to be decided in consultation with your tutor and your peers. This task has three parts: a pitch (10%), a text-only story (20%) and a digital feature produced on the Shorthand platform (20%).
