## OVERVIEW

### Course Description

This course introduces students to the fundamentals of typography and takes a playful approach to exploring the relationships between typographic form, language, images, and graphic elements. Through a series of experimental projects students will develop an understanding of type in relation to scale, colour, form, juxtaposition and context of usage.

## Assessment 1 - Multi-part design project: Design a Typeface - 50%

### Assessment Type

Project

### Purpose

Multi-part design project with two methods of submission: Physical submission (pin-up), and digital submission (via Canvas). A Canvas weekly journal will be used to upload tutorial exercises and process work as part of this assessment.

### Description

Students are required to design a typeface incorporating a minimum character set which addresses a visual communication problem or need. Students are required to sketch all characters on paper, scan and digitise them, and use software to make their typeface keyboard-functional. Students are required to record their process and lead-up work and present it as part of assessment. Online submissions must be in PDF file format. Both

## Assessment 2 - Multi-part design project: Design a Typographic Publication - 50%

<b>Assessment Type</b>	Project
<b>Purpose</b>	Multi-part design project with two methods of submission: Physical submission (pin-up), and digital submission (via Canvas). A weekly Canvas journal will be used to upload tutorial exercises and process work as part of this assessment.
<b>Description</b>	Students are required to design a publication which showcases the use of typography and page layout as core design techniques. The topic of the publication is letterpress, and students must use UoN's letterpress equipment as part of their document. The publication should show evidence of understanding of grid systems, typographic hierarchy and creative typeface choices. Students are required to record their process and lead-up work and present it as part of assessment. Online submissions must be in PDF file format. All three methods of submission are compulsory.
