Course content will contextualise and analyse news media through a lens that explores cultural, historical, political and economic perspectives.

Assessment 2 – Topic Champion and Journal

Assessment Type	In-class group presentation and journal entries
Description	Topic Champion - In a group, students will prepare and make a presentation on the topic of the previous week's lecture and lead a class discussion on the same topic. Journal entries – Students will be organised into either the even-week group or odd-week group. They will have to write five journal entries across the trimester, reflecting on the weekly topic and class discussion.

Description	Each student will research and produce a slideshow and news feature on the same topic suitable for publication on the national student website <i>The Junction</i> . This task will include a social media component and will have staggered deadlines.
