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SYLLABUS

Course Content

Legal framework and principles - construction process

Broad understanding of the structure of the Australian legal system, the common law, the law of torts (including negligence, nuisance and trespass) and statutory duties and liabilities relating to the construction process.

Introduction to the court system, tribunals and other methods of dispute resolution including alternative dispute resolution (ADR), adjudication and arbitration.

Liabilities and responsibilities of parties

Contract Law: formation of contracts, identification of the parties to a contract, description of their rights and obligations, common contractual claims and liabilities.

Statute: introduction to key legislation applicable to construction process.

Common law: key duties and potential liabilities relating to construction process, including under the law of torts.

Organisation and practice of a company

Introduction to law relating to the organisation and practice of a company, including the legal status of companies.

Property Law

Introduction to law of land and property.

Course Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the nature and significance of key legal principles applicable to the construction process
- 2. Describe the rights, obligations and liabilities of parties to a contract
- 3. Formulate and argue tortious claims and defences of parties involved in, or affected by, the construction process
- 4. Apply the principles of property law to the construction process
