SYLLABUS

Course Content

The ability to communicate ideas, visualise concepts and understand form, proportion and structure are essential visual skills for a designer. The development of drawing skills and knowledge informs and enhances students' abilities to think laterally. Critical analysis, communication of ideas, problem solving and visual research are developed through drawing projects using both traditional and digital technologies.

Topics may include:

- 1. Visual symbols
- 2. Sketching techniques
- 3. Observation skills and analysis
- 4. The elements and principles of design.
- 5. Geometry, perspective, light, form and shadow
- 6. Anatomical drawing skills

- 1. Communicate ideas effectively through drawing
- 2. Demonstrate and implement an understanding of visualisation skills appropriate to the design process
- 3. Carry out individual visual research
- 4. Analyse images
