# **OVERVIEW**

**Course Description** 

This course is the first of two courses that involve students in the design and conduct of an independent research project and the production of a written thesis. The project and thesis must sit within the field of educational scholarship and research.

Requisites

This course replaces EDUC4975. If you have successfully completed EDUC4975 you cannot enrol in this course.

**Assumed Knowledge** 

To enrol in this course students must have completed a minimum of 240 units of undergraduate study.

If students complete Part A but are unable to complete Part B within the timeframe, they must re-enrol in Part A. Part A cannot be completed as a standalone course, it will only count towards your program once you have successfully completed Part B.
