OVERVIEW

Course Description This course focuses on essential capabilities for executives to keep abreast of emerging technologies and evaluate the relevance of digital technologies to their organisation's business activities, both global and local. Demonstrating the influence of current digital technologies on business strategies, this course will assist participants in identifying significant trends and their implications for innovation management. International case studies, cutting edge examples and reference to industry contexts (national and international i.e. cyber security and its influences) will be used throughout the course. Major topics include: artificial intelligence (AI), cyber security, block chain, big data, the Internet of Things (IoT) and how such technologies could benefit business and their organisations.
