Presentation

Students are required to present seminar (duration of no more than 30 minutes) outlining and "defending" the results of their research. The presentation should clearly outline the task or problem addressed (usually in the form of a hypothesis), the methods used to obtain and analyse the data, and the outcomes obtained from the study including some assessment of their significance.



Students are required to prepare a Research Abstract and a Research Poster, in a style

compatible with presentation at a scientific conference. Seminar presentation contributes 90 % of this course.

Abstract contributes 5% of this course. Poster contributes 5% of this course.
