OVERVIEW

Course Description

This course provides students with coherent and advanced knowledge of intellectual property rights, including patent, copyright, trade marks and Indigenous cultural and intellectual property. The course discusses the rationale behind each intellectual property right, their scope and enforcement mechanisms. Students are involved in the discussion on advantages and disadvantages of the current intellectual property regime, recent and possible future developments in this field, and critical and contextual approaches to intellectual property law, including the relationship between intellectual property rights and justice.

Skills Focus

This course will focus on assisting students to develop the following skills:

- Problem Solving
- Oral Communication

Compulsory attendance

Attendance at all classes will be monitored and records maintained by the Course Coordinator. Partial attendance will not meet the attendance requirement for a given class unless prior approval has been given by the Course Coordinator or Lecturer. (To be clear, simply being present for purposes of the roll call does not on its own satisfy the attendance requirement. As such, even if you have been present for the roll call, if you leave early without permission you are agreeing that your attendance will not count for that week.)

Note also that if you miss more than 2 seminars for reasons that fall within the University's adverse circumstances policy you may be required to complete additional assessment items to ensure that you have completed the required volume of learning for this course.

The weekly seminar class may be recorded and made available to students for revision and independent study purposes.

Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate advanced knowledge of statutory regulation, case law and practice on intellectual property in Australia and where relevant, jurisdictions overseas.
- 2. Apply acquired specialist legal knowledge and argumentation skills to issues involving intellectual property.
- 3. Participate in key policy debates surrounding future development of international and domestic intellectual property law regulation and enforcement.



4. Discuss and critically reflect on intellectual property law issues and the relationship between intellectual property law and society.

Multimedia Assignment

Students will work in groups of 2-3 to submit a 5-6 minute video related to a topic related to Modules 1-4 (Wks 1-7), on an intellectual property law debate, controversy, or issue. Students can self-enrol in their chose group up until the end of Week 2, after which they will be assigned to a group by the convenor. Students are required to work together to design an engaging recorded presentation. This assessment requires research outside of the

course materials. Further details will be provided on Canvas.

Assessment 3 – Final Assignment

Assessment Type Description

Written Assignment

This task involves a legal problem requiring identification and application of relevant legal principles to a hypothetical set/s of facts. Students will need to analyse the issues given in



relation to the rules that apply. Modules 5–6 are potentially assessable (Wks 8-12). More detailed instructions will be added to the Assessment folder on Canvas. The assignment will

be released on Canvas on the 30 May, 2pm. It will be due the 9 June, 11:59pm.
