OVERVIEW

Course Description	This introductory course immerses students in the philosophy of midwifery and introduces the concept of midwifery praxis taken up in this degree. Underpinning concepts are explained through the practice model of continuity of midwifery care with respectful acknowledgement given to all midwifery and collaborative maternity ways of working. Introduction to midwifery care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women has particular emphasis.

Assessment 1 – Annotated Bibliography Part A: Search Terms and 10 Best Articles (10%)

Assessment Type Annotated Bibliography

Description

Students will demonstrate skills in searching the library databases for peer reviewed recent relevant research articles relevant to midwifery knowledge, skills and practice. Choose one topic from the list on the Canvas sites and then search a number of midwifery databases for recent relevant literature, policy and guidelines to include in your annotated bibliography.

For Part A of this assessment students will search relevant library databases to discover the extent of literature, policy documents and guidelines related to their chosen topic. It is anticipated students should include between six and ten references. Write a list of the steps you undertook to conduct the search (200 words), the search terms used, the name of the databases searched (e.g. Maternity & Infant Care Database (MIDIRS), the reason for choosing the article/policy/guideline. Submit this summary together with the list of up to ten

(10) articles/policies/guidelines in the APA 7th referencing style (no more than one page).

Assessment 2 – Annotated Bibliography Part B: Annotated Sources (40%)

Assessment Type Students are required to compare and contrast their chosen articles. This can be presented in a table or in succinct paragraphs.

Description The literature included in your annotation should be peer reviewed research articles retrieved from the library databases for midwifery and published within the last 10 years. You will use the articles retrieved and submitted for Part A (unless feedback indicated you need to submit a different article). Search engines such as Google will provide you with Consumer websites, Wikipedia, and other non-academic sources and these are unacceptable. You are required to write a concise annotation that summarizes the central theme/topic/concept and scope of the article. The description/summary of the work can include the following (a) recency of publication (b) where the article is set eg. Metropolitan/urban, regional rural or remote Australian setting (c) compare or contrast this work with another you have cited, or (d) indicate how useful you found this work in relation to adding to your knowledge on this topic.

Assessment 3 - Final Essay (50%)

Assessment Type Essay

Description	In this essay students are required to analyse the role of the midwife in providing woman centred care. The discussion should conceptually map the midwives' role in alignment with the legal, ethical, and professional frameworks for midwifery practice. Please refer to the International Confederation of Midwives Essential Competencies (ICM, 2018) and the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia's Midwife Standards for Practice (NMBA, 2018) to underpin your discussion of the role of the midwife. The essay should discuss the role of the midwife as an advocate for woman centred care. However, this role needs to be contextualized in the setting. Taking into account such things as the resources available in the setting and how the midwives can advocate for those childbearing people who do not identify as women. At least ten references should be used to support your discussion. These should be peer reviewed research journal articles published within the last 10 years. Do not cite textbooks, consumer websites, online blogs, Wikipedia or newspaper articles. Further information will be provided through in-class discussion and workshop.
