# **OVERVIEW**

**Course Description** 

This introductory course immerses postgraduate students in the philosophy of midwifery and introduces the concept of midwifery praxis taken up in the postgraduate degree. Underpinning theories are critically analysed through the practice model of continuity of midwifery care with respectful acknowledgement given to all midwifery and collaborative maternity ways of working. Reflective analysis of midwifery care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women has particular emphasis.

### Assessment 1 - Scoping Review - Midwifery Professional Frameworks Part A

### **Assessment Type**

Written Assignment

#### Description

The purpose of undertaking a scoping review is to understand the extent and type of evidence in relation to Midwifery Professional Frameworks (Policy and Guidelines, research-based literature and other forms of literature).

Students will demonstrate skills in searching the library databases for policy, guidelines, frameworks, peer reviewed recent relevant research articles and other literature that is relevant to Midwifery Professional Frameworks.

For Part A of this assessment students will search relevant library databases to discover the extent of literature related to Midwifery Professional Frameworks. It is anticipated students should include between six and ten references. Write a list of the steps you undertook to conduct the search (200 words), the search terms used, the name of the databases searched (eg. Maternity & Infant Care Database (MIDIRS)), the reason for choosing the article/policy/guideline. Submit this summary together with the list of ten (10) articles/policies/guidelines in the APA 7th referencing style (no more than one page).

### Assessment 2 - Scoping Review - Midwifery Professional Frameworks Part B

### **Assessment Type**

Written Assignment

Description

The purpose of undertaking a scoping review is to synthesize the existing evidence in relation to Midwifery Professional Frameworks. Students will use the literature retrieved from Part A of this assessment to synthesize and present findings on the scope and extent of the literature including policy, guidelines, research-based literature and other forms of literature.

Students will use the following structure/headings to organise and present the scoping review.

Objective: State an overarching review objective using the key components of the inclusion criteria (approximately one or two sentences). e.g. The objective of this scoping review is to understand the extent and type of evidence in relation to Midwifery Professional Frameworks.

Introduction: Briefly describe the rationale for the review considering what is already known on the topic (approximately two to three sentences).

Inclusion criteria: Summarize the inclusion criteria using the participants, concept, and context and highlight any relevant exclusions in paragraph format. Present the information in one to three sentences – NOT under individual subheadings.

Methods: List the key information sources searched/to be searched (those from which the majority of evidence sources were/will be located), the date (month/year) the search was conducted (for reviews only) and any search limits (e.g., language). Briefly describe the approach to study selection, data extraction, analysis of the evidence and presentation of the results. Briefly describe any notable deviations to the methodological approach taken.

Results: Convey the results of the review in relation to the objective/question. Report the number and type of included evidence as well as any pertinent study characteristics.

Conclusions: Provide a conclusion based on a general interpretation of the review findings in line with the review's objective/s and any limitations of the review. Briefly convey key implications of the findings for practice and research (if any).

### **Assessment 3 - Essay**

**Assessment Type** 

Written Assignment

Description

In this essay students are required to analyse the role of the midwife in providing woman centred care. The discussion should conceptually map the midwives' role in alignment with the legal, ethical, and professional frameworks for midwifery practice. Please refer to the International Confederation of Midwives Essential Competencies (ICM, 2018) and the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia's Midwife Standards for Practice (NMBA, 2018) to underpin your discussion of the role of the midwife. The essay should discuss the role of the midwife as an advocate for woman centred care. However, this role needs to be contextualized in the setting. Taking into account such things as the resources available in the setting and how the midwives can advocate for those childbearing people who do not identify as women. At least ten references should be used to support your discussion. These



should be peer reviewed research journal articles published within the last 10 years. Do not cite textbooks, consumer websites, online blogs, Wikipedia or newspaper articles. Further

information will be provided through in-class discussion and workshop.
