## OVERVIEW

<b>Course Description</b>	This course inspires students individually and in groups to begin developing, creating and recording their own music. It cultivates both technical and creative practices that support the writing, arranging and recording of music with an emphasis on using technology as a creative tool. The course covers fundamental concepts of song writing, music composition and sound design in addition to digital production skills relevant to this level of study.
