Assessment Type

Part A: Discussion 1500 words Part B: 3-minute presentation

Description

Part A: This assessment task requires the student to choose one chronic health condition or a disability from the provided list located in Canvas - Assessments. Students are required to write a 1,500-word discussion of an evidence-based approach to the nursing care and management strategies associated with the chosen chronic health condition.

Part B: The student will record and submit to canvas a 3-minute presentation targeted to their classmates about a chronic health condition or disability chosen in Part A. They'll highlight one aspect, share important and interesting facts, and discuss about how it can affect care for people with the chosen chronic health condition.
