OVERVIEW

Course Description

Traditionally mentally disordered offenders engender high levels of anxiety and therapeutic pessimism amongst mental health professionals. This course provides students the opportunity to develop knowledge and enhance their skills to work effectively with this population. Commencing from a broader perspective of Crime and Health, students will explore the policy and legal context in which their practice with this clientele occurs and examine the systems issues, and clinical and interpersonal issues specific to forensic mental health.

Course Content

- 1. Historical perspectives, impact of crime on health and current policy and legal context
- 2. Systems issues and ethical issues in forensic mental health
- 3. Clinical and interpersonal issues specific to forensic mental health
- 4. Evidence based treatment interventions and future directions

Course Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Identify the psychosocial determinants of people with complex and difficult behaviour in the psychiatric and criminal justice systems and the impact of crime on health
- 2. Demonstrate familiarity with current legislation in regard to forensic patients and mentally disordered offenders under the Mental Health Act and the practical application of this legislation at a systems level
- 3. Discuss the process of effective assessment and engagement of mentally disordered offenders in a range of settings including prison, community and forensic hospitals
- 4. Appraise current tools and strategies to assess and better manage risk of potential violence of mentally disordered offenders towards others
- Reflect on personal values and attitudes arising when working with people whose behaviour and presentation is challenging and confronting and identify and resolve ethical dilemmas specifically arising with mentally disordered offenders
- 6. Examine and evaluate issues related to cultural safety and vulnerable populations (such as Indigenous Australians) relevant to the delivery of care in forensic settings
- 7. Critically examine current and developing theories (and related research) of personality development, psychopathy, ASPD and BPD and future directions in the provision of forensic mental health services

REFERENCING

Any documents provided to you to use in the preparation of an assessment must be referenced. Direct quotes MUST be referenced. However, please note direct quotes should be used sparingly and should not normally constitute more than 10% of an assessment.

Information that you have paraphrased in your assessment must also be referenced. Correct citation of sources and referencing is expected in scholarly writing at Master level. Assessments that are not correctly referenced may be penalised (lower marks awarded).

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Assessment 2 - Written Assignment – Discharge Report

Assessment Type

Written Assignment

Purpose

Integral to effective learning is the ability to reflect upon your learning and to carefully consider the application of new understandings to clinical practice

Description

This assessment requires the student to answer set questions on a specific case study of a forensic patient who is to be released from the forensic hospital. The activity is designed to facilitate and evaluate your professional writing skills and develop your ability to complete a comprehensive discharge report.

Please read the case study details for Mr X, which are available in Canvas.

INSTRUCTIONS:

Mr X is to be released from the forensic hospital on a stated date after review by the Mental Health Review Tribunal. He is to be released with conditions for the provision of structured mental health care from the local community mental health team.

You, as the mental health nurse, have been asked to prepare the discharge report for Mr X. Using the information provided within the case study, you are required to devise a mental health nurse-led management plan that is appropriate for his cultural, spiritual, mental health, physical, and social needs. This report is to be provided the community mental health nurse allocated to case manage Mr X upon release.

Review the information provided and develop a discharge report that captures the relevant information required to ensure that a positive, person-centred outcome is achieved. Each answer requires supportive contemporary high quality literature.

- 1. What legal, biological, psychological, environmental, and social-occupational obligations are to be considered for Mr X, and how can these be incorporated into a community managed treatment plan?
- 2. What are the anticipated problems that may arise within the community that require addressing and how should Mr X be managed?
- 3. Evaluate the protective factors that Mr X has and what is his risk of offending in a violent manner in the future? How should this risk be assessed?
- 4. Provide a mental health nurse-led management plan to manage identified risks and his mental health

Purpose

To develop a narrated in-service education presentation for your colleagues that provides a case history for your chosen forensic mental health patient from the list provided.

Description

For this assessment, you are required to develop a narrated in-service education presentation (maximum of 10 slides, excluding the reference list), which addresses the assessment objectives. Narrative to be a maximum of 12-minutes in duration.

The first slide must include: Your name, Target audience, Outline the plan for your presentation, and a brief description on why you have chosen to present this forensic patient and relevance to your target audience

INSTRUCTIONS:

Select one of the forensic vignettes and prepare a case history using PowerPoint with audio presentation describing your chosen case. You must include the following details in your presentation:

- **Demographics**
- Social determinants
- Previous mental health history, intervention, and adherence (if any)
- Psychopathology and theoretical perspectives
- Criminogenic behaviours, substance misuse, and risk factors
- DSM-5 mental health diagnosis
- Legal considerations/ Court proceedings and outcomes
- Structured mental health nurse-led treatment plan consistent with diagnosis, cultural considerations, social and emotional wellbeing, and possible legal classification
