OVERVIEW

Course Description

This course is designed for students to advance their understanding of contemporary primary health care service delivery. Students will explore the emerging directions of primary health models of care from an international and national perspective. This will include universally evolving changes in burden of disease, national health reforms to meet challenges of evidenced based care, interaction between communities and their social and physical environment, influence of social and cultural determinants on health behaviour and clinical governance.

- 1. Analyse, synthesise and critically evaluate the relationship and importance of the international and national public policy reforms for securing healthier communities, through Health Literacy and Health Promotion.
- 2. Demonstrate an advanced understanding of person- centred contemporary models of care that integrate public health with primary care, organised around people's needs and expectations to empower them in making appropriate health care decisions.
- 3. Critically analyse the interaction between communities and their social and physical environment and the ways in which these factors may impact on a person's clinical presentation, access to health care and ability to comply to with a health plan within rural and remote areas
- 4. Apply established theories to research, critically analyse and synthesise information to discuss the role of epidemiology in understanding public health issues, risk factor management of National Health Priority conditions and emerging trends in Primary Health Care
- 5. Communicate and engage through consultation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander populations to strengthen skills to achieve and maintain good health

REFERENCING

Your assessments must be appropriately referenced. Assessments that are not correctly referenced may have lower marks awarded.

What should be referenced?

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All sources of published information including textbooks, journal articles, course readings, websites, guidelines, policies government documents that have been used to prepare an assessment MUST be included in the assessment as an intext citation AND on the reference list.

Any documents provided to you to use in the preparation of an assessment must be referenced. Direct quotes MUST be referenced. However, please note direct quotes should be used sparingly and should not normally constitute more than 10% of an assessment.

Information that you have paraphrased in your assessment must also be referenced. Correct citation of sources and referencing is expected in scholarly writing at Masters level. Assessments that are not correctly referenced may be penalised (lower marks awarded).

Correct referencing style

Making referencing easier

Purpose This assessment is assessing Learning Outcome 3 which requires you to critically analyse

the interaction between communities and their social and physical environment and the ways in which these factors may impact on a person's clinical presentation, access to health care

and ability to comply with a health plan within rural and remote areas

Description This short essay requires you to choose a **priority health condition** and MUST explore

person centred models of care that would be suitable in **promoting health and wellbeing** including risk factor modifications for your chosen health condition. A critical analysis

of relevant contemporary literature and policy documents is required.

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Background: Discussion on the chosen priority health condition with supportive contemporary high quality literature.

Discussion and Critique: Using contemporary high quality literature,

- Discuss person-centred models of care and their contribution to promoting health and wellbeing (including risk factor modification) for your chosen health condition
- Critically analyse the interaction between communities and their social and physical environment and the ways in which these factors may impact on a person's clinical presentation, access to health care and ability to comply with a health plan within rural and remote areas.

Conclusion: Summarise the key points

Assessment 3 - Written Assignment

Assessment Type

Written Assignment

Purpose

This assessment is assessing Learning Outcome 4 and 5 which requires you to apply established theories and research to explore the role of epidemiology in your understanding of public health issues, management of National Health Priorities and emerging trends in Primary Health Care, whilst considering vulnerable populations.

Description

This assessment requires you to explore a primary health care topic of interest. Ideally this will be a National health priority area and involve care for a vulnerable population (such as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples).

Prepare a brief overview of one (1) primary health care topic relevant to your practice.

Background: provide a brief overview of the chosen primary health care topic relevant to your practice (approximately 200 words)

Critical Analysis (approximately 1000 words): Critically analyse and synthesise the literature on.

- The role of epidemiology in understanding the health issue,
- Risk factor management of the condition, and
- Any emerging trends in care for the population impacted by this health care topic.

Summary and Recommendations (approximately 300 words): Conclude your essay by making recommendations on how communication and engagement at the local or regional level with the population impacted by your health care topic could be enhanced to improve outcomes and maintain good health.
