REFERENCING

What should be referenced?

All sources of published information including textbooks, journal articles, course readings, websites, guidelines, policies and government documents that have been used to prepare an assessment MUST be included in the assessment as an in-text citation AND on the reference list.

Any documents provided to you to use in the preparation of an assessment must be referenced.

Direct quotes MUST be referenced. However, please note direct quotes should be used sparingly and should not constitute more than 10% of an assessment.

Information that you have paraphrased in your assessment must also be referenced. Correct citation of sources and referencing is expected in scholarly writing at Masters level. Assessments that are not correctly referenced may be penalised (lower marks awarded).

The assignment will consist of short answer questions that will be used to critique the systematic review. The questions are adapted from the JBI Checklist for systematic reviews and research syntheses (JBI 2020). Assessment 3 - Written Assessment 2

Assessment Type

Written Assignment

Description

For this assessment task, you will choose a research topic and plan a **qualitative study** to address the topic chosen.

The research plan must include the following components:

- 1. Background (approximately 500 words): discuss the background for this qualitative study and provide a justification for why the research is needed (supported by high quality contemporary literature)
- 2. Research Question (approximately 50 words): state a qualitative research question on the selected topic that clearly identifies the study population and phenomenon of interest.
- 3. Study Design (approximately 700 words):
 - a. Describe an appropriate methodology to address the research question for this qualitative study.
 - b. Describe the study population, eligibility criteria, study sample, sampling method and recruitment methods for this qualitative study.
 - c. Describe what methods you will use to collect and analyse the data for this qualitative study
- 4. Study limitations and rigour (approximately 150 words): discuss the rigour/trustworthiness and limitations for this qualitative study (supported by high quality contemporary literature).
- 5. Ethical Considerations (approximately 200 words): Discuss the ethical implications for this qualitative study including vulnerable populations (such as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples) where applicable. This is to be supported by high quality contemporary literature and relevant state or national research polices.
