ORHL1101: Oral Health Sciences I

OVERVIEW Course Description ORHL1101 introduces students to and function of the dental hard and

ORHL1101 introduces students to the development, structure and function of the dental hard and soft tissues. The aetiology, pathology, clinical presentation and principles of management of the plaque related dental diseases (dental caries and periodontal disease) will be described. The social, cultural and environmental factors that contribute to oral health or ill health will also be addressed.

This course is a compulsory program component and students must pass in order to progress in the Bachelor of Oral Health Therapy program. Students are unable to enrol in Year 1 Semester 2 and Year 2 and 3 clinical courses until they have passed this course.

Course Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe the macroscopic and microscopic appearance of the teeth, periodontal tissues and alveolar bone and relate these to composition and function;
- 2. Describe the developmental stages from zygote to birth with specific reference to the development of the nasal cavity and the oral cavity and its contents;
- 3. Describe the development of the teeth, periodontal tissues, mucous membrane and alveolar bone:
- 4. Identify developmental abnormalities of the dental hard and soft tissues;
- 5. Identify abnormalities of appearance and structure of the teeth, periodontal tissues, mucous membrane and alveolar bone;
- 6. Describe the aetiology and pathology of dental caries and periodontal disease;
- 7. Describe how dental caries and periodontal disease can present and identify such disease;
- 8. Describe the underlying principles of the management of dental caries and periodontal disease;
- 9. Discuss the social, cultural and environmental factors that contribute to oral health or ill health.

Course Materials

This course is based on the text and accompanying workbook: Illustrated Dental Embryology, Histology and Anatomy by Margaret J Fehrenbach & Tracy Popowics.

This text is supported by various on-line resources and details of how to access these are provided within the textbook. While other similar books are likely to have the same content,ORHL1101 course material makes specific reference to chapters and pages in the recommended text
