OVERVIEW

Course Description

ORHL2101 builds on communication skills learnt in first year and introduces theories and approaches used in patient management. Strategies for pain control and local anaesthesia, anatomy for local anaesthesia, and pharmacology will be introduced. The course will provide students with the necessary knowledge and skills to provide patient care including the administration of local anaesthetics and taking of radiographs. Clinical sessions will introduce students to the management of patients with simple care needs.

This course is a compulsory program component and students must pass in order to demonstrate clinical safety and to progress in the Bachelor of Oral Health Therapy program. Students are unable to enrol in Year 2 Semester 2 and Year 3 clinical courses until they have passed this course.

Assessment 1 - Ongoing Clinical assessment

Assessment Type Description

Professional Task

This assessment is designed to determine students' intermediate ability to perform specific practical clinical tasks and demonstrate a broad and coherent body of knowledge to a safe level in the clinical setting.

The assessment is carried out throughout the semester and includes completion of tutor assessment and the student's self-assessment and reflection of their overall performance. Recognition is given to the students' cognitive skills shown through their ability to problem solve, to perceive and manage the big picture as well as demonstrating growth as a clinical operator. The assessment criteria include professionalism, communication skills, ethics, knowledge of infection control, WH&S, history taking, examination skills, diagnosis, treatment planning, provision of appropriate and safe clinical care, relationship between general health and oral disease and the overall management of patients.

The student needs to demonstrate professional behaviour and effective communication with the patient in the promotion of oral health. This involves the formulation, implementation and monitoring of plans. This is a cumulative assessment item, with each patient interaction being individually assessed, and feedback provided. This requires that the students reflect on current skills, knowledge and attitudes. The final clinical mark will also include a component of the students overall performance over the semester, giving recognition to the students ability to perceive and manage the big picture, based on an overall review of knowledge, skills and attitudes as a whole, looking at the areas of infection control, team work and confidence, professional standards, communication skills, knowledge levels, ability to use technology, clinical skills, problem solving, clinical reasoning and self- assessment skills 30%.

Assessment 2 - Objective Structured Clinical Assessment (OSCA)

Assessment Type Description

Professional Task

The purpose of this assessment is to assess the students' ability to perform specific practical clinical tasks at an intermediate level.

A 1-hour practical and theoretical OSCA test will be held in Week 13. This will involve practical aspects of local anaesthetic technique and appropriate theoretical knowledge to support this technique. This assessment item examines your ability to safely apply local anaesthetic theory to technique, to ensure that you are able to use these appropriately and safely in the clinical environment.

Pass Requirement - Students must pass this assessment item to pass the course.

Week 12

Submission Method

This is a practical assessment. A roster will be made available on Canvas before week 13. This assessment addresses course objectives 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10. Students transition through a number of 'stations' and are required to problem-solve and perform practical tasks using specialist equipment. They are assessed on their capacity to perform the task by competently applying evidence-based knowledge in a diverse and unpredictable situation to an acceptable standard.

Assessment 3 – MCQ Examination

Assessment Type Description

MCQ Examination

This assessment is designed to assess acquisition of knowledge at an intermediate level to ensure students have adequate underlying knowledge of concepts and theories to support safe and ethical clinical practice. Students will be required to answer 50 randomly generated MCQ questions.

They are required to recall and integrate a broad domain of knowledge relating to communication skills in the management of child and adult patients, and the provision of pain control and local anaesthesia for patients and are assessed on their ability to answer MCQ questions from this material. Students demonstrate information literacy by effectively identifying, critically evaluating and using that information as it relates to health education and practice. This is a closed book examination.
