ORHL2104: Oral Health Therapy Clinical Skills V - Dental Hygiene

Overview

Course Description

ORHL2104 introduces students to the management of oral health therapy patients with a

particular emphasis on dental occlusion and orthodontic patients. Clinical skills laboratory activities introduce new skills such as impression taking, pouring models, construction of mouthguards, clinical photography and placement and removal of orthodontic components and consolidation of previously learned skills. This course is a compulsory program component and students must pass in order to demonstrate clinical safety and to progress in the Bachelor of Oral Health Therapy program. Students are unable to enrol in Year 2 Semester 2 and Year 3 clinical courses until they have passed this course.

Academic Progress Requirements

This course is a compulsory program requirement and is monitored for academic progress purposes. The course must be completed to progress in the program or meet other program requirements.

Failure or withdrawal from this course will result in students being considered under the Student Academic Progress Procedure.

A reflective document of your time within the specialist practice will be completed requiring signature on completion of time from the prescribing orthodontist.

This assessment is designed to determine students' intermediate ability to perform specific practical clinical tasks. These practical skills will run within your workshop and clinical time from

weeks 1-13.

The intent of this assessment item is to ensure that students are making satisfactory progress with their clinical skills development and that these skills are based on a broad and coherent body of knowledge. Students must demonstrate information literacy, clinical reasoning, problem-solving and technical skills and the ability to retrieve and critically evaluate knowledge to enable them to provide safe clinical practice in the simulation environment. The Ongoing Clinical Skills Laboratory Assessment includes dental impressions, intra and extra oral photography, mouthquards and orthodontic skills.

This will be presented as a bound body of work showing skill progression as a culmination of

reflection and practical activities across semester.
