# **OVERVIEW Course Description**

ORHL3102 builds on the knowledge and skills gained by students in first and second years and relates to the assessment, diagnosis and clinical management of dental hygiene and dental therapy patients. Students will treat patients in the University of Newcastle Oral Health Ourimbah Clinic and attend various external placements.

This course is a compulsory program component and students must pass in order to demonstrate clinical safety and to progress in the Bachelor of Oral Health Therapy program. Students are unable to enrol in Year 3 Semester 2 clinical courses until they have passed this course.

### **Academic Progress** Requirements

This course is a compulsory program requirement and is monitored for academic progress purposes. The course must be completed to progress in the program or meet other program requirements.

Failure or withdrawal from this course will result in students being considered under the Student Academic Progress Procedure.

### Requisites

This course is only available to students in the B Oral Health Therapy (12390) program.

Pre-requisite: students must also have successfully completed ORHL2106 and ORHL2107.

This course builds directly on, and requires that you have passed ORHL2106 and ORHL2107.

Students are assessed on evidence of clinical reasoning, initiative, problem-solving and decision-making (judgement), use of evidence, and technical and oral communication skills. Using an evidence-based approach, students must provide a treatment plan and preventive care regime. They must demonstrate sound clinical reasoning and present any social or cultural considerations. This requires students to research, integrate and apply appropriate knowledge relating to the competent clinical management of a patient based on not only on the patient's oral health status. They must apply evidence to support decision-making in

### **Assessment 2 - Ongoing Clinical assessment - Placement**

Assessment Type Description

**Professional Task** 

This assessment is designed to determine students' senior ability to perform specific practical clinical tasks and demonstrate a broad and coherent body of knowledge in the clinical setting. Students are required to demonstrate information literacy, clinical reasoning and technical skills and the ability to retrieve and critically evaluate knowledge in order to provide safe, preventive and restorative clinical care including patient examination, diagnosis, treatment planning and treatment provision. Interpersonal communication, collaboration within a multidisciplinary team, awareness of ethical considerations as well as professional standards are also assessed. This assessment ensures that students have appropriate knowledge, clinical reasoning and technical skills to enable them to continue to provide safe and professional clinical care carried out at placement clinics during the semester. This will involve a perception of your overall performance, giving recognition to your ability to perceive and manage the big picture. It will be based on an overall review of your knowledge, skills and attitudes to ensure your clinical and patient management skills are developing at an appropriate level

### **Assessment 3 - Clinical Communication Assessment**

Assessment Type Description

Viva Voce

This assessment is designed to develop students' oral communication skills and assess knowledge and concepts and theories and the ability to competently and professionally apply this evidence-based knowledge to clinical situations. Students are required to attend a 15-minute oral examination where they will be asked to review a patient and respond to questions about comprehensive oral care. These questions will allow students to demonstrate comprehensive understanding of a body of knowledge and the application of that knowledge in specific clinical situations. The clinical communication assessment provides students with the opportunity to demonstrate their ability to communicate effectively with patients and to convey important messages in a way that can be understood. Students are assessed on their knowledge and ability to orally present sound clinical reasoning and their initiative and judgement problem solving.

Application of this knowledge is directly applicable to safe and effective clinical and professional practice.
