OVERVIEW

Course Description

POLI4002 must be studied in conjunction with POLI4001; POLI4003; and POLI4004 for BSoc Sci and BBus students and together constitute the full Honours program in Politics. BA students do not take POLI4002 and instead take HASS4001. The Politics Honours program enables students who have distinguished themselves in Politics at the undergraduate level to continue advanced studies in politics and political analysis and provides them with the tools to undertake advanced, independent research. As such it forms an introduction to the world of international political scholarship and research.

Contact Hours

Integrated Learning Session Face to Face on Campus

Two (2) hour(s) per Week for Full Term

Students are expected to complete 4 hours of guided learning via online preparation, lectures, interactive workshops, tutorials, discussion groups or self-directed learning and an additional 6 hours of independent study per week.

Unit Weighting Pre-Requisites

The Politics Honours program requires successful completion of a Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Social Science, Bachelor of Business or equivalent, with a major in a field relevant to their proposed Honours study and at least a credit average in the field in their undergraduate program.

Workload

Students are required to spend on average 120-140 hours of effort (contact and non-contact) including assessments per 10 unit course.

- 6. Research Skills: Demonstrate the intellectual and practical skills needed to justify and interpret theoretical propositions, and research methodologies, as well as to identify research, evaluate

7. Self-Management: Able to learn and work with a high level of autonomy, accountability and professionalism.

analytical approach. They will present this proposal to their peers for feedback. Following their presentations students will have one week to review and make changes to their

proposals based on the feedback received during presentations.

Length 2000 words + 5 mins presentation

SYLLABUS

Course Content

Topics in the course include but are not limited to the following:

The Honours program in Politics consists of two inter-related elements, coursework and thesis, which are designed to provide the student the opportunity to explore in greater depth interests developed during their undergraduate degree.

The coursework component is provided jointly by POLI4001 and POLI 4002 or for BA students in HASS4001. POLI4002 spans thirteen weeks of advanced study of Politics topics. These topics may vary from year to year depending on staff availability and student demand and will give you the opportunity to engage with the most recent research debates in the respective sub-fields of political science. As part of the specialist topic.

POLI4002 will contribute 25% towards the total Honours mark.
