**PSYC2800: Special Topics in Psychology** 

Online Semester 1 - 2024



### **OVERVIEW**

**Course Description** 

Psychology is an extremely diverse discipline ranging from mental health to the underlying molecular mechanisms of behaviour. While all aspects of psychology are interesting and important, each student will be drawn to different areas of the discipline. This online course allows students to choose the areas they wish to explore while building essential written communication skills and developing a learning portfolio. Students choose their own course content from a list of available topics that introduce students to areas of psychology that are of interest and could lead to additional areas of interest and advanced topics in evolving areas. By the end of this course, you will know more about the direction your interests and learning will take and will have acquired knowledge in areas of psychology that relate to your learning goals. The topics may include specialised modules in clinical, biological, social, cognitive, and developmental psychology.

Assumed Knowledge At least 20 units of psychology courses at 1000 level.

Purpose	The PSYC2800 Written assessment task is designed to allow students to expand their comprehension of the content provided in each module and demonstrate advanced written
	communication skills on a specific topic area.
Description Weighting Length	One written assessment for each module selected (worth 15% each) 45% 800 words each. Word limits include headings, sub-heading, in-text citations, quotes and referencing but does not include the list of references, appendices, and footnotes. The word limit will allow a tolerance of 10% and any work after the maximum word limit will not be included within the allocation of marks. In other words, the marker will STOP reading at 880 words.

Purpose	The PSYC2800 portfolio assessment task is designed to allow students to reflect on their experience in the selected psyc topics. It could aid in thinking about building their skills in creating a resume or CV in preparation for employment.
Description	The task requires students to Reflect on their own learning in a very specific and targeted way. Students will identify the knowledge and skills they have acquired throughout the course.
Weighting	25%
