PSYC6000: Foundations of Applied Psychology 1

OVERVIEW

Course Description

Psychology is a diverse and fascinating area of study. This course helps you understand human behaviour and mental processes and allows you to better interpret how we think, act, and feel. It also helps you to develop interpersonal skills and abilities that are transferable to the workplace. The course provides an introduction of the key areas of psychology for students with no prior background in the discipline. There are five main psychological perspectives used to study different aspects of human behaviour and mental processing: biological; cognitive; behavioural; socio-cultural and developmental. Biological, cognitive and behavioural perspectives will be covered in Module 1, where you will examine how a person's perceptions, thoughts, feelings, and behaviours influence how we interact with the world around us. Other perspectives in psychology focus on individuals and groups in society, and how social and cultural factors can influence and shape our thoughts and behaviour. Some perspectives are clinical in nature and can be related to psychological therapy. Developmental perspectives aim to understand how thoughts and behaviours change over time. You will learn about these perspectives in Module 2. In this module you will also learn about how psychology can be used to inform our understanding of human behaviour in forensic contexts. This course is not part of an APAC accredited sequence.
