OVERVIEW

Course Description

This course provides a set of core skills to help respond to those who are experiencing a mental health problem until appropriate professional help is available. It provides training in best practice and evidence-informed approaches to initially assist with mental health issues in the workplace and the community. By the end of this course, you will be able to identify the signs and symptoms of common mental health problems, provide initial assistance to those experiencing a problem, respond to a crisis situation, and find and refer to appropriate professional help.

- 4. Demonstrate knowledge and skills in referring those experiencing mental health challenges to appropriate informational and professional resources.

Assessment 2 - Project report Part A

Assessment Type

Purpose

This reflective writing task is designed to demonstrate a number of factors that might moderate the ability to provide support to a colleague in the workplace. This task draws together several of the activities (learning journals, Padlets, Independent Investigation etc)

undertaken through the course.

Description

Using suitable writing format (dot-point or prose) within a reflective writing style, demonstrate how factors relating to the self, workplace, and interaction between the two may impact the ability to provide mental health support in a workplace context, considering both strengths and weaknesses.

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Assessment 3 - Project report Part B

Assessment Type

Project

Purpose

This written task is designed to demonstrate an evidence-based understanding of how to provide mental health support in the workplace, including appropriate elements of a

conversation as well as referral to further mental health support.

Description

Using the scenario provided, generate a transcript of a potential conversation with a colleague in the workplace indicating key elements of active listening and reasoning for the approaches used based on responses (Part 1). Follow up with an email referring the

colleague to appropriate mental health support services (Part 2).

1400 words (+/- 10%)

The word limit will allow a tolerance of 10% and any work after the maximum word limit will not be included within the allocation of marks.
