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OVERVIEW

Course Description

Psychological assessment is a key component of organisational psychology skill set. This course covers a broad range of psychological interviewing and assessment skills and measures. Course modules are primarily designed in relation to organisational and business psychology fields. Students will learn how to evaluate appropriate tools for capturing desired data, within an ethical framework. A variety of interviewing, survey and other methods will be reviewed and practiced. Emphasis will be placed on the scientific analysis of interview and other assessment data, including the limitations of each measure.

Description

There will be 6 multiple choice online quizzes to complete. Each quiz will relate to the content from each of the six consecutive modules. Once a quiz is opened, thirty (30) minutes will be allowed to complete it. Each quiz must be completed in a single session. Each quiz will contain 5 questions and will be worth 5% of the final grade, thus collectively, the 6 quizzes will constitute 30% of your final course mark. The questions are drawn from the modules and readings and may require application of that knowledge. Quiz 1 will assess content from Module 1. Quiz 2 will assess content from Module 2. Quiz 3 will assess content from Module 3. Quiz 4 will assess content from Module 4. Quiz 5 will assess content from Module 5. Quiz 6 will assess content from Module 6. It is intended that you complete each quiz after completing the relevant modules.
