Late Submissions

### Assessment 1 – Journal Entries (1 batch per six-week batch) (60% total)

**Assessment Type** 

Description

This assessment item has two components, A and B. Part A is crucial preparation work: Contribution to FutureLearn workshop discussion. Part B is the marked component: The Weekly Journal, submitted in two batches, the first comprising entries for weeks 1-6, the other entries for weeks 7-12. Part A is the collaborative, informal, conversational version of this, while Part B features more individual-based and polished written responses. (At the end of the course, the Research Essay, meanwhile, involves much more depth-oriented scholarship. Speaking of which, throughout Parts A and B above, when you find a screening or idea especially interesting and you have the desire to write a lot more, this is a good sign that you may want to choose that week for your Research Essay topic - in which case, save those good ideas in a draft document for later!)
