## OVERVIEW

<b>Course Description</b>	Introduces the sociological perspective through an exploration of contemporary social and cultural issues. Topics may include: socialisation and identity, sex and gender, race and ethnicity, class and social inequality, globalisation and work, deviance and social control, and media and popular culture. Key sociological concepts and theories are used to examine social patterns, social action and social change.

## Assessment 1 - Tutorial Exercises (Podcast)

<b>Assessment Type</b>	Tutorial Exercises
<b>Purpose</b>	The podcast will focus on the application of sociological knowledge and the development of students' academic skills. Podcast involves learning the conceptual material, using relevant example and developing skills in terms of working with others.
<b>Description</b>	<p>Students will form groups and will make a ten minute podcast in which they explain and critically discuss a sociological question. All planning, preparation, writing, recording and uploading is up to each group to manage in their own time outside of class. One person from each group should nominate to upload an audio file on the due date. All group members will receive the same grade for this assessment.</p> <p>The 10 minute Group Podcast will focus on the application of sociological knowledge and the development of students' academic skills.</p> <p>In week 3 tutorials, your tutor will place you in a group of up to 6 students to work together on the project.</p>

<b>Length</b>	10 minutes of podcast per group

How you respond to the prompt question – is it addressed fully? The structure and organisation of the podcast – is it presented clearly and logically?</p>

## Assessment 2 – Library Research Essay Plan (LREP)

<b>Assessment Type</b>	Report
<b>Purpose</b>	The LREP is designed to help you prepare for your Essay.
<b>Description</b>	Students will interpret an essay topic, find six academic sources on that topic and create a brief essay plan.
<b>Weighting</b>	15%
<b>Length</b>	750 words
<b>Due Date</b>	Thursday March 28, 11:59pm.
<b>Submission Method</b>	Online copy to Turnitin, via the course's Canvas site
<b>Assessment Criteria</b>	<p>You will be marked of the following criteria:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Your interpretation of the topic and identification of appropriate keywords for your library search.</li> <li>- Your selection of appropriate resources.</li> <li>- The structure and clarity of your essay plan – is it organised clearly and logically in a conventional essay format.</li> <li>- Writing style; comprehensibility, spelling, grammar.</li> <li>- Correct referencing in text and a reference list.</li> </ul>

### Assessment 3 - Essay

**Assessment Type** Essay  
**Purpose** The essay is a method of communicating your knowledge and understanding about a topic within a given timeframe and word limit.

**Description** Choose one of the following essay questions:  
1. Critically analyse the statement that Australia is a 'classless society'.  
2. In what ways is gender difference a basis for inequality in contemporary society?  
3. Critically analyse the notion that Australia is an egalitarian society with reference to racism and ethnicity.  
4. In what ways do the media reinforce class, gender or race inequalities? (choose either class, gender or race, you do not do all three in this question)

**Weighting** 40%  
**Length** 1500 words (referencing not included in length)  
**Due Date** Sunday June 2, 11:59pm.  
**Submission Method** Online copy to Turnitin, via the course's Canvas site  
**Assessment Criteria** You will be marked on the following criteria:  
- How you have answered the specific question.  
- Your understanding of the course materials (lectures and readings from the textbook) and your own further reading and research.  
- Your argument – does your essay take a specific stance or present a distinct reading of the essay question.  
- The structure of your essay (including introduction, content, and conclusion – for instance, does your conclusion coherently summarize the main point(s) of your essay?).  
- Writing style; comprehensibility, spelling, grammar.  
- Correct referencing in text and a reference list at the end of your essay following the School guidelines.

## Assessment 4 - Examination

<b>Assessment Type</b>	In Term Test
<b>Purpose</b>	Students are to complete four quizzes that test their knowledge of the ideas, concepts, and theorists discussed in the required weekly readings and lecture recordings.
<b>Description</b>	<p>Each quiz is comprised of 10 multiple-choice questions. The questions are based on course content covered in the three weeks of the course preceding the week in which the quiz takes place.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Quiz 1: covers weeks 1, 2 and 3</li> <li>- Quiz 2: covers weeks 4, 5, and 6</li> <li>- Quiz 3: covers weeks 7, 8, and 9</li> <li>- Quiz 4: covers weeks 10, 11 and 12.</li> </ul> <p>Each quiz will become available on the Monday at 9:00am and close at 11:59pm on the Sunday of the following week.</p>
<b>Weighting Length</b>	30% (4x7.5%) Students will have 60 minutes to complete a quiz. This time limit begins after the student has successfully logged on to the system. The 60-minute time limit and the randomisation of questions help to prevent cheating and promote academic integrity
