Assessment 2 - Group Project

Assessment Type

Purpose

Project

The purpose of this assessment is for students to work together to conduct a case-history interview with an individual, apply the ICF, and present a summary of the interview results to the class. Individually, students will then write a short summary the information and reflection

Description

The Group Project involves three parts: the first two parts involve group work, and the third part involves individual reflection.

Part 1- Students will be allocated into groups of around 4-6 students; they will then prepare for (including gaining informed consent) and conduct a case history interview and complete an ICF template. The group is required to submit the results (including completed case history form, ICF template and a deidentified consent form i.e. interviewee's name and date of birth removed) to the Canvas submission portal by Friday 17th May, 2024 (Week 10). Note that it is expected that every group member will contribute to this document, and that ONE group member will submit a copy of the document to the submission site on behalf of the group (i.e., students develop this part of the assignment together, work on it together, and provide the same document to the Canvas site). All group members receive the same mark for this part of the assessment.

Part 2 - The groups will prepare a short PPT and present a summary of information gathered about their case to the tutorial class (max. 7-8 mins). The presentation must incorporate ICF. The presentations will be delivered during tutorials in Week 11 or 12 (as allocated by their tutor. All group members receive the same mark for this part of the assessment. All students must be present for their group presentation and all students are required to present verbally as part of this assessment.

Part 3 - After completing Parts 1 and 2, students will independently summarise the information obtained and complete an individual written reflection. The written reflection will be submitted to the Canvas submission portal by Friday 31st May (Week 12). Note that the document for this part of the assessment is worked on and submitted individually. That is, your reflection is individual in nature, and must not mirror that of any of your group peers. Each individual submits their own work for this part of the assessment, and each individual is allocated a mark based on their own individual submission (group members may therefore not receive the same mark as their peers for this part of the assessment task). 30%
