Social policy development processes, including analysing and debating social policy. 3. Links between economics, law, politics and social policy. 4. Ways in which policy and services address equality, social justice and human rights, including activism. 5. How social work skills, practice, research and intervention methods are applied to policy practice. 6. How to present written, oral and multimedia information to a target audience (including government submission, video, conference abstract, conference presentation, conference paper).

- Ways in which policy and services address equality, social justice and human rights, including activism
- How social work skills, practice, research and intervention methods are applied to policy practice.
- How to present written, oral and multi-media information to a target audience (including government submission, video, conference abstract, conference presentation, conference paper).
