Course Description

Students will develop the skills, knowledge and ability to create a live-action short film. Working in groups students will take on the role of either a screenwriter, a director, a cinematographer, an art director, a sound recordist/composer or an editor. Emphasis in this course will be focused on original treatment of the story through crew collaboration and creative processes for location film production.

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SYLLABUS

Course Content

Topics to be covered are:

- Professional production practices and creative processes for screen-based practitioners working in collaborative groups.
- Industry expectation for short film productions including budgets, planning and scheduling, risk assessments, legal and copyright issues.
- Editorial, technical and aesthetic content development for short film productions.
- Planning and realising a short film production on time and within a limited resource base

Course Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop skills, knowledge and understanding of short film production through collaborative filmmaking practice;
- 2. Develop and critically analyse short film scripts for location based productions;
- 3. Identify and critically reflect on the creative process related to short film production practices;
- 4. Demonstrate an understanding of industry expectations in regard to WHS, risk assessments, budgeting, ethical and moral issues, and safe working practices

Attendance & Engagement

This course is intended for THIRD YEAR students who have completed courses in cinematography, sound, and foundations of media production. The course adopts standard industry practices wherever possible. Success in this course is highly dependent upon:

- 1. Attendance in the intensive 3-hour workshops (weeks 2-5)
- Crew collaboration and, in particular, finding ways for every member of a crew to be engaged and attend crew-based activities. Crews will need to establish regular times (outside scheduled class time) when ALL MEMBERS OF THE CREW can meet for preproduction planning, the shoot, and post-production.

Description

Scene exercise - Working in small groups allocated in class, students will film a script they are given. The objective is to work on an idea that belongs to someone else and to turn it into your own piece of dramatic, cinematic storytelling. Students will be allocated specific crew roles and will complete the (condensed) paperwork that is allocated to each crew role.

Students will work in pairs to edit the short film. For this assessment students must use university camera equipment and any students filming on non-university equipment will receive a grade of zero.

Groups of 5-6 students will be created around the crew roles of Writer, Producer/1st A.D., Director, Cinematographer, Art Director, Editor/Sound Designer. Group progress will be monitored during the semester. Group work criteria laid out below will apply to this assignment. For this assessment students must use university equipment and

any students filming on non-university equipment will receive a grade of zero.
