## **Assessment 2 - Project**

Assessment Type Project

**Purpose** To focus learned skills into two major works.

**Description** You will be tasked with producing two themed illustrations, each worth 25%. One illustration

will be large scale, whilst the other being a physical piece. Both pieces will be prepared for

digital uploads, along with developmental work.

Weighting 50% (2x25%)

**Length** 500 words / Approximately 10 A4 pages
