Course Description

In this course, students will develop the skills to work in radio broadcasting and produce podcasts for streamed or online delivery. The course will follow the production cycle of a podcast from receiving an editorial brief from a client and/or conceiving an original podcast idea through production to post-production and distribution. Students will analyse radio and podcasting genres, formats, and industries and create their own audio project suitable for dissemination via online podcasting platforms. They will develop and apply production skills, including writing for podcasting, interviewing talent, recording and mixing audio sources, and operating the podcasting studio.
